WEEK 5 - SOTERIOLOGY (PART 2)

CONVERSION - THE SALVATION EXPERIENCE

<u>DEFINITION OF CONVERSION</u>: to <u>turn around</u> in reaction to God's <u>grace</u>

TWO ELEMENTS OF CONVERSION: (MARK 1:15)

- 1. <u>REPENTANCE</u> involves godly <u>sorrow</u>, turning from <u>sin</u> to <u>God</u>, <u>conviction</u>, change in <u>attitude</u> towards God, and change in <u>conduct</u> (2 Cor. 7:9-10).
- 2. <u>FAITH</u> involves placing your <u>complete trust</u> in God, being totally <u>committed</u> to Him, completely <u>dependant</u> upon Him, and governing your <u>actions</u> by Him (Prov. 3:5; John 5:24; Col. 1 :22-23).

FOUR ASPECTS OF SALVATION:

1. <u>REGENERATION</u> - being <u>born again</u>, <u>renewed</u>, made <u>alive</u>; spiritual <u>resurrection</u> into a new life with God through Jesus Christ (John 3:3-8).


- 2. <u>JUSTIFICATION</u> God declared those who trust in Jesus Christ to be "<u>not quilty</u>", and treating them as being <u>righteous</u>; God sees them through the righteousness of His Son (Rom. 3:24-28).
- 3. <u>ADOPTION</u> refers to someone becoming God's <u>child</u>; whereas regeneration gives someone the <u>nature</u> of a child of God, adoption gives them the <u>position</u> of a child of God (Rom. 8: 15-16).
- 4. <u>SANCTIFICATION</u> <u>Separation</u> from sin unto God, being made <u>holy.</u> <u>set apart,</u> for God, <u>dying</u> to sin and <u>living</u> to righteousness.


THREE ELEMENTS OF SANCTIFICATION:

- 1. <u>PAST</u> (at time of conversion) separation from the <u>penalty</u> of sin ... made holy (Heb. 10:10).
- 2. <u>PRESENT</u> separation from the <u>power</u> of sin ... ongoing process (Col. 3:3-5).
- 3. <u>FUTURE</u> separation from the <u>presence</u> of sin ... completion of the process in heaven (1 Thess. 5:23).

QUESTION: If we are sanctified at conversion, how can sinfulness still be a part of our lives?

ANSWER: When we are saved, the <u>old man</u> is dead (crucified with Christ-Rom. 6:6), but we are <u>always</u> struggling with our <u>sinful nature</u>, because it is an attribute of our bodies -- we are fallen human beings with an inclination to sin; although we are sanctified <u>positionally</u> in Christ (seen as holy through Him), we must become sanctified <u>progressively</u> (made more like Him every day) ... the process of sanctification involves <u>putting to death</u> the sinful attributes day by day until eternity.





At conversion Jesus removes the foundation of the old man, replacing it with Himself; then brick by brick the body of sin is replaced by holiness and righteousness.
